IMPACT: KĀKO'O 'OHANA



Neighborhood Place of Puna

In the last 12 months NPP has seen a dramatic increase in the number of families coming to Neighborhood Place of Puna for assistance. This past quarter, a family came to us with an open Child Welfare Services (CWS) case. The father had struggled with substance abuse and the family became homeless. NPP was able to shelter them at our family shelter — Hale Iki. The shelter connected the family to our Family Strengthening program where the family requested assistance in improving their communication skills and learning better ways of disciplining their child. NPP staff, in communication with CWS, assisted the family in increasing their understanding of the stages of child development and their knowledge of developmentally appropriate parenting. NPP helped the parents develop strategies and approaches to apply positive discipline vs reactionary punishment. Over time, with practice and ongoing coaching by NPP staff the family showed improvement in employing developmentally appropriate parenting techniques and positive discipline strategies. The parents have reported that the child is exhibiting fewer challenging behaviors. The parents also worked on their sobriety and the mom and dad are currently sober. The mom is pregnant, and the family has shown remarkable improvement in family functioning and communication. With the help of our Shelter Housing NAPP and access additional assistance as needed.

As donors and supporters, we want to know that the nonprofits we invest in use our money effectively and ethically. Nonprofit transparency is vital to building this trust and ensuring that organizations are accountable for their actions.
