

A study by Yeung, Zhang, and Kim, researchers from the Department of Applied Social Sciences, City University of Hong Kong, found that volunteering led to an 8.54% increase in mental health, 9.08% increase in physical health, 7.35% increase in life satisfaction, 11.11% increase in social well-being, and 4.30% decrease in depression (BMC Public Health

As a result of Hawai'i Island United Way Partnership grant a participant with developmental disabilities has been able to expand his nature photography business. THE PULLARS OF HINDS

The pillars of HIUW are **education** -encouraging and nurturing positive values to develop skills in children, youth and adults; **income** -empowering families and individuals to become financially stable; increasing self-sufficiency and independence; and **health** - Providing for basic needs and a safety net of services that promote prevention and encourage healing and recovery. These pillars are addressed through HIUW's various grant programs including The Partner Agency Community Impact Grant Program, The FEMA Emergency Food and Shelter Grant Program, and Disaster Recovery Grant Programs.

HIUW's grant opportunities provide much needed supplemental funding to the many local nonprofit organizations' health and human service programs in our community including food pantries and commercial kitchens serving hot meals. HIUW invested \$130,000 into providing shelter to individuals who were houseless and \$271,000 toward addressing food insecurity in Hawai'i county in the past year. HIUW invested \$300,000 into 36 local health and human service programs that address HIUW's 3 pillars. These partnerships collectively move people from crisis to stability every day. Though HIUW's main focus is supporting the people of Hawai'i island, we don't forget our neighbor islands. When the Maui Fires happened, HIUW pivoted to raise funds to support the disaster recovery programs our sister United Way (Maui United Way) created. HIUW raised over \$20,000 in a matter of days to support our island friends. Our donors, volunteers, staff and community partnerships continue to make it all happen, year after year. We are grateful for your support and together we will continue to strengthen these pillars.
